riting role-plays as scripts on a typical day-to-day engagement or lesson topics is a great way to help both students and teachers learn certain facts (or so it seems). It helps students develop their imagination and intellectual development. It affords an approach to learning by involving students in their own learning while at the same time helps them to discover their writing skills in terms of creativity. As such, the BCA 5th Semester students were each asked to script a role play on a given topic and scene. The intention of this activity was varied although the primary intention was to understand how far students understood the relevance of a topic previously covered. Each student was asked to identify and script a typical challenging classroom affair and thereby, weave in the theme of classroom etiquette particularly focused on discipline. Students were also asked to identify characters, find (a) problem/s and provide their responses in the form of suggestions and solutions to the problem they brought in with their characters.


