This certificate course can vary from minimum 3 months to 1 year, which is offered in very few Universities and Institutions.

Apart from feeding on mosquitoes, moths and other annoying insects, it is also considered a rare reptile. It climbs on to ceilings and can crawl upside down.


When we observe these unique attributes, it makes us realize that, weird as it may look, it
