A memoir dedicated to my great grandmother, Rani Gaidinliu



26th on orn 1915 January present-day in Tamenglong district of Manipur, my great grandmother Rani Gaidinliu was a Naga spiritual and political leader who led a revolt against the British colo-

nial rule in India.

When she was born, high priests predicted that she would grow up to become an extraordinary woman.

At the age of 13, she started a political movement seeking to drive out the British from India. She also began her own version of the Non-cooperation movement among Naga tribes and made it difficult for the British administration to function in the region.

Rani Gaidinliu was arrested at the age of 16 and was sentenced to life imprisonment for waging war against the British. She was released in 1947 after India's independence, and continued to work for the upliftment of her people.

By acknowledging her role in the struggle against the British, Jawaharlal Nehru called her the "Daughter of the Hills" And gave her the title of "Rani" (Queen) and she gained local popularity as Rani Gaidinliu.

Rani Gaidinliu passed away at the age of 78 but before that she was bestowed a number of honours including the Tamrapatra Freedom Fighter Award in 1972, the Padma Bhushan in 1982, the Vivekananda Seva Summan Award in 1983, the Stree Shakti Puraskar and she posthumously was awarded the Bhagwan Birsa Munda Puraskar.

The state government developed a park along with a statue to honour the late freedom fighter in Silchar, Assam.

The Government of India issued a postal stamp in 1996, and also issued a commemorative coin in her honour in 2015.

Rani Gaidinliu was one of the few women political leaders who exhibited outstanding courage during the colonial period, despite limitations.



She was undoubtedly a beacon for the Zeliangrong people in particular and Nagas in general for showing the way to integrate with the mainland India.

Rani Gaidinliu will remain an icon of the North-East India since she gave her people a sense of identity and left a legacy that the region of northeast can produce one of the most courageous woman freedom fighter in India.



Department of History organized Webinars


