Our batch started with 25 students, and by the end, 21 of us remained. And what a group we were. We had our fair share of disagreements, sure, but that only brought us closer. From sharing notes to throwing surprise birthday parties, these were people who truly made college feel like home.

And who could forget our WhatsApp group? Named "ICFAI BCA 1st sem", it kept the same name all the way till the end. For months, it'd be a ghost town. But the moment exams or tests came around, boom, messages flying, notes being dropped, stress, chaos, and the occasional meme. That group carried us.

I was also lucky to be part of some great moments, like being crowned Mr. Ethnic during the freshers' event, or being chosen as sports secretary in my final year. I loved being involved, I was that "volunteer for everything" kind of person, and honestly, I wouldn't have it any other way.

Of course, there were the not-so-fun parts too, the dreaded C1 and C2 tests, the eternal pressure of keeping that 75% attendance, and the last-minute panic before every deadline. But what truly made it manageable was the supportive, kind-hearted faculty. They understood us. They gave us room to be human, letting us take breaks, allowing a little harmless off-topic fun during class, and always giving us chances to bounce back.

Looking back now, ICFAI was never just about classes or credits. It was about chai breaks and corridors, hostel nights and event snacks, shared panic and louder laughter. It was about people, the kind you meet once and carry with you forever.

What truly stays?

Coffee-stained notes? Deadlines we miraculously survived? Professors who terrified us and inspired us in equal measure? The awkward first-days encounters that later journeyed into steadfast camaraderie? Or the lessons we never found in the curriculum?

Reflecting on my days in ICFAI University, I'm struck by how it was never just about lectures and assignments. The lecture notes might be gathering dust somewhere, but what stayed were the habits we built- perseverance when the semesters got heavy, finding sparks of creativity in the middle of a deadline panic and learning it is perfectly fine to ask for help.

This perspective, rooted in literature yet deeply human, continues to guide me today.

More than facts and theories, ICFAI taught me to reflect, to share, and to really listen. Looking back, I'm glad to have been a part of ICFAI University. It is not just a degree I carry forward, but how it taught me to keep learning, questioning, and growing after graduation. And most of all, to the Department of English for every subtle push beyond my comfort zone while making it perfectly normal to debate the meaning of a single line for half a class and for proving that the right metaphor can land better than any punchline.
