Citizenship Amendment Act: **A THREAT to India's Democracy

he Citizenship Amendment Act passed recently by the parliament on 11 December 2019 has been condemned by both citizens and international forums alike. Over the past few months we have witnessed countrywide protests against the Act from different parts of the country. The ruling BJP government has declared that the Act aims to grant citizenship to six minority communities (Hindus, Sikhs, Parsi, Jain, Buddhist and Christians) from Pakistan, Bangladesh and Afghanistan. It is debatable as to why the central government is trying to give refuge to the minority communities of other countries when it has failed over and over again to protect the minority communities from the oppression by the majority community (Hindus) within its own country. RSS activists are slaughtering people in the name of religion, the so-called Political Brahmacharis are trying to make INDIA a Hindu Rashtra, the voice of the people are silenced through force and if anyone tries to speak against the injustice of the government, they are termed as anti-nationals and the list goes on and on.

The Act is a clear example that the agenda and motive of their government is entirely based on religion. We need not do the math in order to understand the simple fact that in the countries mentioned by the BJP government, the number of Hindus will be more against the combined numbers of the remaining five religions. Leaving that aside, now,

has the government ever mentioned that the Act benefits the legitimate citizens of India in any way other than its aim of granting citizenship to illegal migrants? No, because there isn't any. The only possible outcome of this act would be more protests, more atrocities from police and loss of more innocent lives. In the northeastern states especially Assam, the prospect of citizenship for massive numbers of illegal Bangladeshi migrants has triggered deep anxieties, including fears of demographic change, loss of livelihood opportunities and threat to indigenous culture. There is also an economic problem. If tens of thousands leave Bangladesh and start staying legally in Assam and North East, the pressure will first show in the principal economic resource-land. It also boils down to the political rights of the people of the state. Migration has been a burning in states like Assam and Tripura. There is a view that illegal immigrants, who will eventually become legitimate citizens will be determining the political future of the state. All of these in the case of Assam will lead to the violation of the Assam Accord, which was a prior agreement reached with the central government on migrants and refugees. Dr. Shurhozelie Liezietsu was right in saving that many convincing points might have been highlighted by leaders

remarked that it all might sound good but were actually cover-ups for the



real motive of the Act, warning that its effect would be slowly visible through 'population politics'. If anyone is of the idea that the assurance from the BJP leaders will save the people of Nagaland and our unique culture, language and identity, well, we should think again because despite the age old ILP regime in Nagaland (except Dimapur which was also recently brought under ILP), how far have we been able to prevent the influx of illegal migrants. Nagaland will end up like Tripura where the number of illegal migrants has outnumbered the original inhabitants.

It is undeniable to say that the protest in Nagaland is not as strong as compared to the rest of the north eastern states. We need to remind ourselves that if the Act affects even one of these states the whole of the region will suffer the brunt of it. We've managed to correct some of the errors committed by our government over the years and we've even managed to topple down the government during our fight against the ULB elections but our fight against injustices shouldn't be limited within our area. I'm not talking about showing solidarity for the other states because we're equally in danger as the rest of them are. We need to be as strong and resilient as them in our fight against the CAA.




It was in August of 2018, when I joined ICFAI University Nagaland. And seriously, at first, I was not excited about joining the University because of the limited information about the University.
